Receiving early and regular prenatal care improves the chances of a healthy pregnancy and a healthy birth.

SUCCEEDING IN SCHOOL & LIFE

At-risk children without high-quality early childhood education are 25% more likely to drop out of school, and 70% more likely to be arrested for a violent crime.

Significant improvement in an indicator is judged to be a percentage difference in the value between 2010 and 2014 (or as noted) which is greater than +/- 2% (according to the formula $(y_2 - y_1) / y_1 \cdot 100 > 2\%$ or $(y_2 - y_1) / y_1 \cdot 100 < -2\%$) and is in favorable direction according to the results desired.
